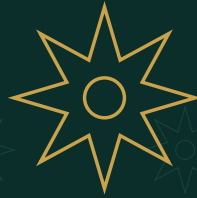

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The Surah at a Glance

*Yaaa ayyuhal-lazeena aamanoo lima taqooloona
maa laa taf'aloona*

2. O you who believe! Why do you say what you do not do?

*Kabura maqtan 'indal-laahi an taqooloo maa laa
taf'aloona*

3. Most hateful it is to Allah that you say what you do not do.

*Innal-laaha yuhibbul-lazeena yuqaatiloona fee
sabeelihee saffan ka-annahum
bunyaanum-marsoos*

4. Indeed, Allah loves those who fight in His cause in ranks, as if they were a solid welded structure.

Everything Is Already Glorifying Him

Beta, this surah belongs to the family of surahs that open with tasbeeh — 'SABBAHA LILLAHI MA FIS-SAMAWATI WA MA FIL-ARD' — whatever is in the heavens and the earth glorifies Allah, and He is the Almighty, the Wise.

Feel the setting it creates before a single command arrives. The stars in their orbits, the waves rolling in, the ant carrying its grain, the rain falling on a field no human owns — all of it already in the service of Allah, obeying without argument, without delay. And then the surah turns to us — the only creation that TALKS about obedience — and asks the question that gives this surah



its fire.

Because that is the surah's whole theme, beta: creation obeys silently; man speaks loudly. Where do the two meet? In the one who says AND does.

The Gap That Allah Hates

The background, beta, as the scholars of tafseer relate: some believers used to say — if only we knew the deed most beloved to Allah, we would spend our wealth and our lives in it! Beautiful words, spoken sincerely. Then the commands came, and jihad was prescribed — and some of the same tongues went quiet, and some feet grew heavy.

And these ayahs descended, and they sting every generation equally: 'YA AYYUHAL-LAZINA AMANU, LIMA TAQOOLONA MA LA TAF'ALOON — O you who believe! WHY do you say what you do not do? KABURA MAQTAN 'INDALLAHI AN TAQOOLU MA LA TAF'ALOON — most HATEFUL it is with Allah that you say what you do not do.'



Weigh that word, beta — 'kabura MAQTAN'. Maqt is not mere displeasure; it is deep, swollen hatred. Allah did not say 'this is a weakness' or 'this is a shortcoming'. He named it among the things most hated with Him. Why so severe? Because the gap between the tongue and the limbs is the exact crack in which hypocrisy grows. A believer whose words outrun his deeds is building a house with a fault line under it — and the deen he speaks about becomes, in people's eyes, a thing men speak about but do not live.

So hold the mirror close, beta. The father who lectures about salah and delays his own. The adviser whose advice never visits his own home. The one who posts reminders online while his private hours deny them. The student who says 'I will start tomorrow' for the hundredth time. This ayah does not ask us to speak less good — it asks us to catch up to our own words. Say it, then chase it.

The Wall That Allah Loves



And immediately, the surah shows the opposite — what Allah LOVES: 'INNALLAHA YUHIBBUL-LAZINA YUQATILOONA FI SABEELIHI SAFFAN — Allah loves those who fight in His cause in RANKS — KA-ANNAHUM BUNYANUN MARSOOS — as if they were a solid structure, welded with molten lead.'

Look at the picture, beta. Not scattered heroes charging in different directions, each admiring his own courage. BRICKS. Each one holding its assigned place; each one strengthening the one beside it; no gaps for the enemy to enter; no single brick claiming to be the whole wall. 'Marsoos' — the Arabs used it for stones set so tightly with molten lead that wind could not pass between them.

And this design, beta, is not only for the battlefield. It is the design of a masjid row — which is why the Prophet ﷺ would straighten the saff with his own hands and warn that gaps in the rows are gaps for shaytan. It is the design of a family, where each member covers a weakness of another. It is the design of a team, a masjid



committee, a community project. Ask yourself in every group you belong to: am I a brick holding my place — or a stone lying loose, admiring myself?

Two Prophets, One Complaint

The surah then places two mirrors before us, from two great nations before us.

First, Musa (alaihis salam), saying to his people: 'YA QAWMI, LIMA TU'ZONANI — O my people, WHY do you HURT me, when you KNOW that I am the messenger of Allah to you?' Beta, feel the sorrow in it: they knew. Their pain was not ignorance; it was knowing, and still hurting him. And then the terrifying consequence: 'So when they deviated, Allah caused their hearts to deviate.' Guidance is a gift, beta — when a person repeatedly turns his heart away by choice, Allah may confirm the turn. Never play with the light you have been given.

Second, Isa (alaihis salam), son of Maryam, saying: 'O Children of Israel, I am the messenger of Allah to you,



confirming what came before me of the Torah — and bringing good tidings of a Messenger to come after me, whose name is AHMAD.' The name of our Prophet ﷺ, announced by an earlier prophet, centuries before his birth. The prophets are one caravan, beta — each one pointing toward the next, none competing with the other. But when Ahmad ﷺ came with clear proofs, some said: 'this is obvious magic.'

And upon those who fight the light, the surah passes a famous verdict: 'They want to extinguish the LIGHT of Allah with their MOUTHS — but Allah will perfect His light, however much the disbelievers dislike it.' Blowing at the sun, beta. Fourteen centuries of mouths have blown; the azan still rises five times a day across every continent.

The Trade With Guaranteed Returns

And now, beta, the passage that makes this surah beloved to every believer — Allah Himself, the Owner of all treasures, making an offer like a trader calling out in



a marketplace: 'HAL ADULLUKUM 'ALA TIJARATIN TUNJIKUM MIN 'AZABIN ALEEM — Shall I GUIDE you to a TRADE that will SAVE you from a painful punishment?'

Notice His courtesy, beta. He could command; instead He invites, and He calls it a TRADE — because a trade means both sides gain. What does a trade need? An investment, and a return. Read them both.

THE INVESTMENT: 'You believe in Allah and His Messenger, and you strive in the cause of Allah with your WEALTH and your LIVES. That is best for you, if you only knew.'

THE RETURNS: 'He will FORGIVE you your sins, and admit you into GARDENS beneath which rivers flow, and PURE DWELLINGS in Gardens of everlasting residence. THAT is the great attainment.'

And then — as if the deal were not generous enough — a bonus dividend, paid in this world, in advance: 'WA UKHRA TUHIBBOONAH — and ANOTHER thing that



you LOVE: NASRUN MINALLAHI WA FATHUN QAREEB — help from Allah, and a near victory. So give good tidings to the believers.'

Beta, every market on earth crashes eventually; every scheme carries fine print; every 'guaranteed return' in the dunya has a footnote of risk. This is the only trade in existence underwritten by the Owner of all markets — and He even added the thing our hearts crave in advance: help, and a victory that is near.

Be the Helpers of Allah

And the surah closes by handing us a title and an open application form: 'YA AYYUHAL-LAZINA AMANU, KOONOO ANSARALLAH — O you who believe! BE the HELPERS of Allah — as Isa, son of Maryam, said to the disciples: who are my helpers for Allah? The DISCIPLES said: NAHNU ANSARULLAH — WE are the helpers of Allah!'

Think about the honour hidden in that phrase, beta. Allah needs nothing and no one. Yet He calls those who



serve His deen 'ansarullah' — MY helpers — the way a king might call a child's small effort 'my great support', to honour the child. And notice: the disciples' answer was not 'we will try' or 'we support the idea'. It was an identity: WE ARE the helpers of Allah. They signed their names to it.

And history recorded the result, which the last ayah states: 'So We supported those who believed against their enemy, and they became DOMINANT.' The party that hosted the call outlasted the parties that mocked it.

So the application form is still open, beta, in every generation and every field. The teacher who teaches a child Fatihah correctly is ansarullah. The doctor who treats the poor with mercy is ansarullah. The honest shopkeeper, the mother raising a Quran-loving child, the young man who builds a website so someone somewhere can read a surah — all of them are answering Isa's question with the disciples' answer. And, beta, remember this surah's own first lesson while you answer: say it — then DO it. Otherwise the word



'ansarullah' becomes exactly the kind of saying this surah opened by warning us against.

What This Surah Teaches Us

1. Audit the gap between your words and your deeds weekly — it is the exact crack where hypocrisy grows, and Allah named it among what He most hates.
2. Do not speak less good — chase your own words until you catch them.
3. Be a brick, not a loose stone: hold your place in the row — of the masjid, the family, the team — and strengthen whoever stands beside you.
4. Never hurt those who carry truth to you, as Musa's people did — and never play with guidance, lest a turned heart be confirmed in its turn.
5. The prophets are one caravan: Isa announced Ahmad ﷺ; whoever loves one must honour them all.
6. Enter the only crash-proof trade: iman plus striving with wealth and self — the returns include



forgiveness, Gardens, and help in this world.

7. Answer the standing call in your own field —
'nahnu ansarullah' — with your skills, your money,
your time, and above all, your consistency.

Ya Allah, weld our ranks, match our deeds to our
words, enrol us in Your trade, and count us among
Your helpers. Ameen.
